HOPE

As over a hundred little children descended upon St. Paul's campus Saturday the 16th I was wincingly bracing for impact. What?! How could a PASTOR not be teeming with excitement, joy, energy! I'll tell you why... I was T-I-R-E-D. I was with 27 teens for a week in one of the country's hottest cities! I was worn out... beat up... tired! I think I am starting to see where my parents have been coming from all this time! I should apologize to them!

Now to be clear, we had a great group of teens at the National Youth Gathering, but behavior isn't always the problem. Adults, as I have learned, need...adult time! Adult space! And the Kidz Carnival meant coming home from 19,000 youth to 100 more, with decidedly stickier fingers and a greater likelihood of screaming and crying! How do I know? Because before the carnival, before the NYG, there was Vacation Bible School... we all want kids right! God gave me plenty!

So, who could blame me for dreading the countdown...the carnival was upon us. The "kidz" were coming.

St. Paul's, I know I don't speak for myself alone when I say that the past two years have been tiring. And as a congregation we don't even have that many kids. It's been tiring because the barrages that change and challenge throw at us at times can seem constant and without break. And it's not that it's all been bad. No one is complaining about 100 kids smiling, laughing, and enjoying fellowship! No one is complaining about increasing our congregation by ¼, no one is complaining about hosting a giant

Oktoberfest for our whole town, no one is complaining about the real honest-to-goodness transformation people are experiencing as they encounter Jesus through our ministry...

But even the good, the bad, the great, the sad, the joyful, the transcendent...all these things take their toll on our minds, our hearts, and our bodies. They can make us tired.

And that exhaustion, uncertainty, confusion, emotional roller coaster can, in fact, lead to frustration, complaining, and the longing for a good long break.

But while I am a huge advocate for vacations, time off, rest, and recovery...the Kingdom takes no breaks. We march on. We are pilgrims on our way to our heavenly home, journeying through the desert until the day we hear our Lord say, "Well done good and faithful servant" and we enter into his final rest.

So... being as tired as anyone, how do we do this? How do we keep going? Especially when we know that the goal is MORE young people, not less; to incorporate those events into the regular LIFE of the congregation. The desire is to make our church messier with the young in faith, the curious, the hurt, the broken, the loud, the quiet, the crying, the celebration, new instruments and old alike.

I think the answer is hope.

Our sermon series is a walk through Colossians with an emphasis on the story of all

creation, the story of everything and the one who creates it and holds it all together. Colossians reminds us that our stories is THE story of creation, fall, reconciliation, and a new life that is lived by and through a hope. A hope that in all things...the good the bad, and the ugly...all things hold together in Christ, and all things are being worked together for the end of this beautiful story, the resurrection, the life everlasting. But what does that mean for us here?

Paul writes:

³We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you, ⁴ because we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love you have for all God's people— ⁵ the faith and love that spring from the hope stored up for you in heaven and about which you have already heard in the true message of the gospel ⁶ that has come to you.

Hope is faith in future promises...things unseen. Heaven is our hope. Eternity with Jesus is our hope. And faith follows the leader, who is none other than Jesus our Lord, King, and dear friend and brother.

Life in the faith isn't like a job that you can take a vacation from. We are always in transit, marching forward... but may I suggest that we have our great rest in our hope

in Jesus.

Without all of you, this great day would not have been possible.













More Snippets of Ladies Aid History (from meeting minutes)

July 1942—Because of the war, a social was held instead of a picnic...

July 1949—Ladies Aid joined the Lutheran Missionary League.

July 1951—Flower Committee began.

July 1961—Ladies Aid paid for plywood to put up the ceiling in Parish Hall Basement.

Float entered in New Melle Festival Parade won special prize—\$5.

Layettes and leprosy gowns were sewn for World Relief.

July 1962—Ladies Aid gave \$400 for steeple repair and painting.

July 1968—Ladies Aid purchased four pastoral stoles to match altar paraments.
