# New Year, Old Values, New Mission Field, Old Mission

New Year's is the time for New Year's resolutions of course. I will spare you of my recent and updated diet plans, though I know you love to hear about them! I am joking of course!

It is no secret that the last two years of our walk together at St. Paul's there has been a lot of new. And a lot of new means a lot of change and a lot of change, while it can be good, is not always so easy.

That is why it might come as a relief for some of us, that our efforts in synthesizing down to our five core values as a church is not really anything new.

What we found with feedback from our values sermon series was that these values really aren't "new" at all, they are kinda who we are, and have been for quite some time. That is great! We hoped that the values would be "no brainers" for our community of faith! They should reflect who we are as St. Paul's!

What is newer is our articulation... as we continue to translate these values into action and character words for us to live out all the more. We have settled on these values as a congregation, and we hope these newer names feel just as natural:

# Community, Family, Mentor, Generosity, Heritage

These core values should be nothing new... they should be who we have been, are, and hopefully, through our continued efforts, who we will continue to be, for a long time to come or Jesus returns.

While we hope these values are familiar, we do have to acknowledge that the world around us, the mission field in which God

has placed us, and some of the things that we will have to do as a church, may not always be so familiar. They will be challenging, uncertain and even at times risky.

But do consider a new year's resolution. Those things are change too, right? Change for the better? Change for a new sort of future. Change with a hopefulness that there will be something better on the horizon.

We should be able to have much more resolve than any new year's resolution because of the great hope we have in Jesus.

The author of Hebrews writes:

"Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." (Hebrews 11:1)

Jesus is our ultimate rootedness. We should be very familiar with him, for he is the one who has led THE church throughout the changes of generation upon generation, centuries even. He has done the same for St. Paul's who has over seen changes and transitions over its nearly two century span, including its multitude of generations.

St. Paul's we will have to face the new year, the culture, the new communities, and the new era that we are in.

But we have some rootedness in which to venture out bravely like the pilgrims and missionaries that we are.

We have who we are... our values, which will not hold us back in comfort and safety but give us the encouragement to go out as

Ultimately, we will learn how St. Paul's can better partner with the Church, our fellow disciples in Uganda, and not to mention, how they can better partner and serve us, as we mutually walk together, learn from one another, and support and encourage one another as the Church.

I will be providing email, picture, and video updates, as well as utilizing some other ways, to keep St. Paul's connected with the us on our trip.

We will plan on having an after-church luncheon



where we will unpack all that happened on our trip and share future opportunities to walk with HHU and the LCU.

In the meantime, we asked HHU what sorts of things could be helpful to bring on the trip. If you would like to send a little love from St. Paul's we could use the following:

-Soccer balls (they are running very low on soccer balls and these are perhaps the MOST treasured items we could bring the kids.)

-Letters (Generic, "We're thinking of you" or "God loves you" types of messages for those students who do not receive a packet.

-Homemade or purchased, little, inexpensive pieces of jewelry like earrings, bracelets, or necklaces to give to the church women groups to make them feel appreciated.

-socks and underwear (items which are always a need for the kids) – NEW obviously!

-when it comes to school supplies, Uganda has specific items they use for classes which can't be found here, but pencils, pens, erasers, and sharpeners are always in need.

While we will not start formal collection of these items until later in January, you can always drop off donations to the office at any time.

# LERT—Lutheran Early Response Team—Buckets & More

St. Paul's recently collected funds for the buckets needed for LERT to assist in their efforts to help those in need following natural disasters, such as hurricanes, tornados and floods. This collection totaled \$665.00. Each bucket, filled with cleaning supplies, costs approximately \$20.

So, St. Paul's, you have helped 33 families in great need of support during a very difficult time in their lives.





One of our own members, Vicki Zuhone, is a member of LERT. She provided the following information for those interested in knowing more, or even better, joining LERT!

"On behalf of the Lutheran Early Response Team (LERT), we are very thankful for the extremely generous donation from St. Paul's for cleanup buckets.

"These buckets are compiled as a mission of mercy and then given out free of charge to anyone who needs one to help clean up from a natural disaster. They include clean up supplies as well as devotional materials. Often times



this is from flooding, hurricanes, or tornadoes, but it can be for other emergencies, such as a 'derecho' (hurricane on land) or fires. Even subzero temperatures that cause pipes to break would possibly be a reason to need a flood clean up bucket

"LERT is a nationwide organization run by the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. They provide training and resources

for local LERT teams. www.lcms-LERT.org

"Immanuel Wentzville started their LERT group in 2017 and has since had members from at least five other area Lutheran Churches join their team. They always want more members and assistance! Members of all ages above 14 can serve in a variety of capacities—team members can do hurricane cleanup, remove tree debris from tornado affected areas, help redo a flooded basement; house volunteers, make lunches to serve workers; others can donate gas gift cards or simply write thank you cards. Most importantly, everyone can help out by praying for the Lord's work to be done helping others.



"Immanuel Wentzville LERT has been on many assignments, including several hurricane cleanups in Texas and Louisiana, 'derecho' cleanup in Iowa, tornado cleanup in Defiance and Jefferson City, and continues to do lots of flooding cleanup in O'Fallon, Missouri. They intend to head to Florida sometime this spring to help with clean up from Hurricane Ian.
