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Mentor 1

One verse that has transformed the way I think about my life in the Church comes from St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians. Paul says he does what he does that he "might by ALL means win SOME" (I Corinthians 9:22).

This is wildly inefficient. To do whatever it takes, go through all the means and methods, even give up your own wants,

even needs, to do what? Have a few people join a little old church?

Paul's ministry insights however, get at the heart of Jesus himself.

Our mission isn't the vague crowd of "them, those, and they"... but rather to real people, with real lives, who breathe real air, bleed real blood, have hopes, dreams,

fears, and challenges, just like we do. When Jesus came to redeem ALL the world, he surrounded himself, and met with only some. He met them face to face. He healed one person, another he gave forgiveness, to another he lifted by the hand from their deathbed.

I am here to tell you, the sum of all the parts is greatest, and to get to the sum of ciple who loved you, and went out of all those who will be in heaven, we must focus on the some we have been given. The people Jesus has called you to meet face-to-face. To love. To know. To listen to. To care for. To walk with. To suffer. To suffer with.

When our church settled on its core values, one stood out as an immediate opportunity: Mentor.

We agreed as a group that mentoring for our church couldn't mean programs, schools, and studies. At least not at the moment. We simply don't have the means for this. But that is just fine. In the new post-church world we are spe-

> cially poised and positioned to take on an even older, even ancient approach that is still valid today.

In Mentor 1 we are challenging ourselves to put our hands on one person. Name them and engage them. Serve them. Walk with them. Love them. All that we might what? Convert them? No. You

see, conversion is the work of the Holy Spirit. Not you and I. Our work is the work of the disciples. To proclaim the good news of Jesus in thought word and deed, by loving others as he has loved us.

Think about it. Who was your "mentor" in the faith? Odds are they St. Paul's... I want to win them ALL! But weren't necessarily a pastor or a sanctioned church worker. They were a distheir way for you. Who listened. Who cared. Who offered wisdom when called upon.

Paul invites us to the ministry of the Church, with winsome hearts and a sincere concern for people; person-to-person; cultivating, gardening and developing relationships for the sake of the wellbeing of the fellow creature, not for the sake of filling our pews.

As our image says, we want our lives and our relationships to point to Jesus, and shine His light.

And I believe it starts one person at a time.

Our series and exercise will require a commitment of five weeks. This is likely not enough time for you to win anyone over to following Jesus, taking a huge leap in their discipleship, or converting from atheism to Christianity. But it is enough for us to disciple ourselves and begin to think differently about how Church is supposed to work and how we work in it?

Often the church in America has relied too heavily on the church worker, and the church institution for evangelism and discipleship. But you have been given the same ministry of mission as

the rest of the church on behalf of the church. You are being called to take the responsibility home with you, to begin to change your mindset from church growth, to growing in your calling to love and serve people.

So what will this process look like?

You will better learn from biblical witness, how to engage people in love, service, and discipleship.

You will be asked to identify one person, be it a youth, one young in the faith, someone non-practicing, or even a non-Christian and begin an intentional walk with them.

You will be encouraged to pray for this person, develop ways to get to know this person and ultimately serve this person. (We are not focusing on how to convert them. Again, we will witness Christ, and invite them to the joy we have, but we leave the rest to the Holy Spirit).

You will be encouraged to take notes or journal about Pastor Maxx

this experience.

You will be encouraged to join a small group or a group messaging correspondence to share in devotion, prayer, and encouragement as you do the difficult task of sacrificial service.

In believing that one of our values is mentoring, we must become the mentors. That means we must become disciples who are engaged in our own discipleship, eager to learn and grow wise for the sake of the world around us.

If this seems like a lot of work, you are right. But there is

no easy solution to the reality of the world around us and the departure en masse of our neighbors, friends and family away from Jesus and his church.

If we say we value something, we must seek to live it out. What's more, we must do so together.

All that we might win some. The simple math is that if each family at St. Paul's took to mentoring one person, our church would double in a couple of years.

But even that is not the point. The point is that the kingdom of God spans

over seven continents, four oceans, and a host of nationalities, ethnicities, and billions of people. The church is big. We are, by God's grace, a piece of this beautiful tapestry being woven together by the cross of Christ Jesus.

Jesus himself says, "Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over nine-ty-nine righteous persons who need no repentance" (Luke 15:7).

For one person, all of heaven throws a party.

Church is in fact about numbers... but the number is 1. One person, one relationship at a time.

St. Paul's, let us become a church of mentors. Let us be a church of winsomeness. Let us be a church FOR SOME. Let us be the Church of Jesus.

Lutheran Church Extension Fund Demographics Study Presentation



After church on Sunday, July 16, Mike Wadley from the LCEF Missouri District of the LCMS presented the results of the LCEF demographic study our area's potential future growth. The study looked at three age groups that represent the majority of the people who will most probably move into our area: Ages 5-9, 25-40, and 55-65. In other words, young married couples with kids and people building a house and retiring.

This demonstrated to the group attending what our community might actually grow to look like in the future. The results of the study can help our congregation better understand and respond to the spiritual and physical needs of those who actually represent our community.
